## **SYLLABUS**

## **COURSE DESCRIPTION AND LEARNING GOALS**

Guided by the idea that music is humanly organized sound, this course will introduce you to music-cultures from different times, places, and peoples. We will explore many of the cultural, social, political, and economic processes and issues in which music is implicated. One of the main objectives of the course is to help you learn new ways of thinking about, listening to, and discussing music using comparative analytical language, and to think about relationships between musical elements and their cultural contexts.

# **COURSE MATERIALS**

- 1. **Required Text:** Ray Allen et. al., *Music: Its Language, History, and Culture*Note: There are copies of this text on reserve at the Music Library (2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the library)
